A Chance Lunchtime Chat, or a Divine Appointment?

n April of 2024, two pregnancy center

directors who had never met happened to sit by each other at lunch during the Heartbeat International Conference in Salt Lake City. One of the women was from South Dakota and the other was from Ohio. The director from Ohio,

Jen Furay, shared that her center, Starting Point, is located in Mt. Vernon, Ohio and has served women, children and families for more than 30 years.

The director from South Dakota, Rachel Jones, talked about the mobile ministry that her center, Zoe Care

in Yankton, started in 2023. She mentioned that their mobile unit is part of Tennessee Action Council's (TAC's) fleet. Jen was amazed to hear how working with TAC had helped turn the dream of mobile ministry into a reality with no capital investment.

Prior to their conversation at lunch, Jen had dreamed of starting mobile ministry and had even included mobile ministry in their 5-year strategic plan, but the cost of a new mobile unit (around \$250K) created a steep financial hurdle for the center. The center's

board trusted that God would show them the way to mobilize! The timing of the lunch conversation was fortuitous because a donor had paid off Starting Point's mortgage in February. Jen could see God working and making connections that might allow Starting Point to expand its reach through mobile

ministry.

Rachel provided contact information for TAC and in early May, Jen called May Bennett. Jen's first question was whether TAC would consider placing a unit in Ohio, to which May responded that the TAC board relies on God to define TAC's geographic market. Starting Point

Pregnancy Center completed an application for a mobile unit in October 2024 and the board of TAC began working with Jen on the myriad of details necessary to implement a mobile ministry. Jen and board member, Danita Jenkins met in person over lunch with members of the TAC board in December at Crosswalk Church to finalize plans and craft a preliminary timeline. Since that time, TAC refreshed the mobile unit by having the leather seats and couch reupholstered and replacing carpeting in the cab area. A full assessment of the mobile

clinic was conducted by a Newmar service center and necessary repairs were made to ensure optimum operation.

On June 5^{th,} a lovely summer day in Tennessee, Jen Furay, Starting Point's Mobile Operations Manager, Marissa Kunes, and

board member Danita Jenkins, arrived at Crosswalk Community Church to pick up their mobile unit. Volunteers and board members of TAC aathered around the mobile unit in the parking lot to give thanks, lay hands and pray over the unit. Lauren Cochran, Children's Pastor at Crosswalk, led the prayer, asking for God's blessings on the many

lives that will be impacted by this unit and for travel mercies as the Starting Point team embarked on a 450-mile trek to Mt. Vernon. The team arrived in Mt. Vernon safe and sound later that evening. The mobile clinic will soon be re-wrapped in vivid colors that convey hope and new life to women who are uncertain and anxious.

TAC is thrilled to have this new affiliate, Starting Point, join our fleet of mobile clinics currently operating in South Dakota, New York and North Georgia. These clinics minister to geographically distant communities but are united in God's work to serve women, pre-born children and families. We are excited about how He will use this mobile clinic in Ohio to impact the lives of many!

Thanks to all of you who made it possible to send this unit to Ohio! God uses many talents and abilities to accomplish this work. Whether you gave money, played golf, filled a baby bottle bank, sourced companies to refresh the mobile unit, helped with fund-

raising or drove the mobile unit to providers who made repairs and enhancements, we say "thank you!" This work couldn't happen without you!

Foster Care Awareness Month



The month Helping of May was Foster Care Awareness Month, an event

designed to raise awareness of the challenges faced by children in foster care and to acknowledge those who support them. In recognition of the this, Tennessee Action Council partnered with a number of local churches and organizations in a project to refresh cottages which temporarily house Davidson County foster children who have not yet been placed in a foster home. The "refresh" included new bedding and stuffed animals for each child (as well as an inventory of bedding for future placements), an outdoor picnic table, a new couch and bean bag chairs, individual DVD players and DVDs, activities such as diamond art, and several games (soccer game, kickballs, bases, slip and slide, and cornhole).

A workday was held on May 27th during which volunteers delivered these items and helped staff place them. To establish on-going support, Crosswalk Church's Young at Heart Group has added children's books and DVDs to their existing books and magazine ministry and, quarterly, will be delivering "gently used" children's books and DVDs to the cottages.

Thank you for your generous donations to TAC that allow us to participate in these opportunities. And thank those of you who donated items for the refresh. We sincerely appreciate Elizabeth Cochran from Brentwood Baptist who led this project and the churches and other organizations who supported the work.

Update on 2025 Baby Bottle Drives

Baby bottle drives provide an

opportunity for churches, civic organizations or other groups to support the work of Tennessee Action Council's Project Life and Helping Hands by collecting coins, currency, or checks in Baby Bottle Banks. The banks, which look like baby bottles, have a QR code that can be used for credit card donations and they remind donors that all money donated is used to help at-risk children and families.

Union University's Psalm 139 student organization conducted a baby bottle drive again this year. The organization's name is based on scripture that says, "For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful; I know that full well."
